

Dear Friends

My first magazine article from the rectory in Burnley! A time of reflection, looking back and, at the same time, looking forward. It has been a strange time for the family, moving house and welcoming our first Grandson, Arlo, George. We had the most amazing

send-off from Haslingden. As I write this, the excitement of my institution and induction on the 20^{th} is growing. I am so looking forward to being your rector and serving you and our community.

March is here when spring officially begins, new beginnings are seen all around, the daffodils are springing into life, and there is a little more light at the end of the day.

For many in the Christian community, March is the season of Lent – a time of reflection and preparation. Lent is the period of 40 days before Easter which began on Ash Wednesday; by the time you read this, I will have presided at the Eucharist for the first time. We will have marked our foreheads in Ash from burnt palm crosses and oil to recognise that we came from dust, and to dust shall we return.

Observing 40 days of Lent, we copy Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert.

Lent is often marked by fasting from food and festivities. Some people keep Lent by withdrawing from things like Facebook, some from chocolate, and others from alcohol. I would encourage you to start something new, maybe come to our Lent course, find out more about the Christian faith, more about ourselves

As we take up our cross and follow Christ, we can be comforted in our troubles and reflect on the direction of our own lives. I hope as we journey through Lent this year, we will be able to spend time getting to know each other. Look out for me out and about, and say hello!

Take time to reflect and pray about St Peter's and St Stephen's future. I pray we can take time to listen out for God's mission here and ask genuinely, what can I join in with? Lent is a time when we can look at what we do now and ask what we might be able to do in the future.

Ten Things to Remember in Lent >



- **T** Remember the formula Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving—as the three things we need to work on during the season.
- † It's a time of prayer Lent is essentially an act of prayer spread out over 40 days. As we pray, we go on a journey, one that hopefully brings us closer to Christ and leaves us changed by the encounter with him.
- † It's a time to fast. "What are you giving up for Lent? Hot dogs? Beer? Chocolate?" It's almost a game for some of us, but fasting is actually a form of penance, which helps us turn away from sin and toward Christ.
- T It's a time to work on discipline Instead of giving something up, it can be doing something positive. "I'm going to exercise more. I'm going to pray more. I'm going to be nicer to my family, friends, and co-workers."
- † It's about dying to yourself The more serious side of Lenten discipline is that it's about more than self-control—it's about finding aspects of yourself that are less than Christ-like and letting them die.
- **† Don't do too much -** It's tempting to make Lent some ambitious period of personal reinvention, but it's best to keep it simple and focused. We spend our entire lives growing closer to God. Don't try to cram it all in one Lent. That's a recipe for failure.
- † Lent reminds us of our weakness Of course, even when we set simple goals for ourselves during Lent, we still have trouble keeping them. When we fast, we realize we're all just one meal away from hunger. In both cases, Lent shows us our weakness. This can be painful, but recognizing how helpless we are makes us seek God's help with renewed urgency and sincerity.
- **T** Be patient with yourself When we're confronted with our own weakness during Lent, the temptation is to get angry and frustrated. God is calling us to be patient and to see ourselves as he does, with unconditional love.
- **T** Reach out in charity. As we experience weakness and suffering during Lent, we should be renewed in our compassion for those who are hungry, suffering, or otherwise in need. The third part of the Lenten formula is almsgiving. It's about more than throwing a few extra pounds in the collection plate; it's about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God's unconditional love.
- **†** Learn to love like Christ Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial brings us closer to loving like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the Cross for all of us. Lent is a journey through the desert to the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, as we seek him out, ask his help, join in his suffering, and learn to love like him.



Our new series got underway on the 4th February, when a distinguished trio of Diana Harris, Ian Kille and Richard Barnes gave a fabulous recital with a variety of music for soprano, French horn and piano. Our thanks to Diana for making all the arrangements for this wonderful event.

As always admission is £7 and includes refreshments and parking in the school yard (Rawcliffe Street). Concerts finish around noon and the car park remains open until 12.30pm.



When Darkness Falls

The curtain of darkness falls every night. God called the darkness night and the light he called day. This was all in the blueprint of his creation.

Maybe God himself was forewarning us what would happen when He gave man his own free will. We are seeing great evidence of darkness now. The terrible invasion of the Ukraine, the cruel rule of the Taliban who subjugate women by denying them their rights and education. We hear of the persecution of Christians of torture all over the world, of rape and many who live under the rule of tyranny.

Whilst more than half of the world are well fed and clothed, the rest are hungry and have no sanitation, water or anywhere decent to live. When we watch the News, we are distraught by what is happening in the world. Those anguished families who have lost loved ones in the devastating earthquakes in Syria and Turkey. In our own country, stabbing, senseless murders and youngsters being involved in heinous crimes. Oh Lord, when will this all end, we cry?

I am reminded frequently that our God is not just the Good Shepherd, not just the Prince of Peace, which of course he is. He is the God who loved us so much that he sent his son in earthly form to show us the way of truth and love. However, the darkness, fear and the insecurity over-rode many who were in power, and they sought to destroy the light of Jesus. They saw him as a threat to their power and they were eaten up by jealously and hate. However, in the darkness of Calvary all was not lost, in fact everything was gained. Gained by suffering, anguish and sacrifice.

As we approach Lent, let us remind ourselves of Easter Saturday. It's not a day that is spoken about much. What a day though!

God was wrathful. God was furious at the actions of an evil cruel world. His gift of Jesus was destroyed in death. His only son, pierced by jagged thorns, hands and feet marked by driven nails and a sword-slashed gaping hole in his side.

God chose darkness. The day was turned to night. The veil of the temple was ripped into two by the wrath of God himself. The curtain of God's ire completely closed out the light. The earth was darkened by the shroud of death.

Of course, the next day, Easter Sunday, the Power of Almighty God was revealed and the darkness became the glorious Breathtaking Light of a Risen Jesus. The visible manifestation of Everlasting Life in Jesus himself!

As we live through dark days, whether it be through our own eyes, or through the lens of the media, let us hold on to these thoughts.

'God is the light and the darkness will never overcome it.' The victory is won! Jesus will come again in person, as promised. The King of Kings and Lord of Lords! Hallelujah!
