**Gannow Community Centre** provides free drinks and snacks Mondays and Thursdays 9-30 and Tuesday Wednesday and Fridays 1-3pm


**The Hub in Padiham** is open Monday -Friday 10-2pm for hot drinks, toast and daily activities.

#### Dear Friends,



early snowdrops and crocuses are appearing, and daffodil shoots are rising boldly up into the cold air, hopefully about to add a splash of colour to the ground. I'm sure they will be a welcome sight for many as they bring hope of the spring to come, of new beginnings, rebirth, and better, warmer weather.

On February 2nd (or the nearest Sunday, January 28th), the Church celebrates the festival of Candlemas, considered one of the oldest Christian festivals. It marks the light that comes to banish the darkness. Candlemas is halfway between the shortest day and the spring equinox (so hopefully, lighter nights are not far away)!! Some people also believe it can predict the weather for the rest of winter.

If Candlemas Day be fair and bright Winter will have another fight. If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain, Winter won't come again.

Candlemas is the day when people bring all the candles to be used throughout the year to church to be blessed. They ask for God's protection of their homes and families for the coming year. The lights of Candlemas are a reminder of the light of Christ shining in the darkness, bringing hope amid uncertain times.

At the beginning of John's Gospel, we are reminded that Jesus came to be a light in the darkness of this world and shine out as a sign of God's presence among us. 'The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world.'

At Candlemas, we reflect upon the presentation of Christ in the Temple in Jerusalem and the recognition of Jesus by the elderly Simeon and Anna as Christ, the Messiah. When Simeon encounters Jesus, he declares:

'Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word: For mine eyes have seen thy salvation, Which thou hast prepared before the face of all people; A light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel.' (Luke 2:29-32)

Candlemas offers us the opportunity to look back over these past weeks of Christmastide, giving thanks to God for the gift of his son. Simeon sees that the child is the light to enlighten the nations. His words reveal that Jesus is the Messiah of all of God's people.

Later in February, on Racial Justice Sunday, February 11th, at 10.30 am at St Peter's, we have a special guest, Archbishop Stephen Cottrell, to preside and preach at our joint benefice Eucharist. I am sure we will be challenged to engage in the righteous struggle for racial justice for all. The Bible has much to say about justice because, as God's Word, it reflects God's heart for justice. It can be argued that we should love justice because God does! Racism and racial discrimination are justice issues because they deny basic human dignity to women and men who are made in the image of God. They assume all are not equal before God and are not part of God's family. As we strive to be an inclusive church where All are invited and welcome, let us say No to any prejudice of any kind and love as Christ loves us.

The coming of spring brings hope and the promise of new opportunities. So, in February, think about your hopes for the future, the new life, and the joys that may come.



## Resolutions: Do They Really Work?

Realthy body body

We are just getting settled into a New Year, which brings a desire for new beginnings. Have we decided we are going to make changes? Maybe a tidier house, perhaps to be more organised or to stop smoking or drinking and more often than not, trying to lose some weight. Those 'pigs in blankets ' and those Christmas puddings with brandy sauce are now appearing as 'love handles ' and 'mini michelins' round those tight waistbands. The fridge is full of limp lettuce and soft tomatoes as we just felt obliged to finish off the last box of chocolates. Well it was a Christmas present and it would be rude not to open it! (and does anybody really like tofu or kelp?)

Some changes can be made by will power alone, but how much better is it when you ask the Holy Spirit to guide you? A whole lot better! When Jesus had anything to do he was resolute. That is the derivation of the word resolution. In Luke 9:51 it tells us that Jesus 'sets his face to go to Jerusalem'. At this time he was preparing for his last weeks on earth as he accepted his fate, a cruel death - the sacrificial atonement for sin.

We human beings are not often that determined or resolute! We are often tempted and fall by the wayside. If you have fallen off the diet wagon then 'Fitfish' is a Christian fitness and health organisation. The founding director Gaynor van der Burton struggled with food issues for many years. Since 2011 she led over 60 retreats through a healthy whole and free programme, and she does blogs and healthy eating programmes online too. In the light of this, let us be resolute in 2024 in our daily walk. Resolving to live our lives in the light of his word.



## EXPLORING PRAYER Part VII

#### PRAYERS OF CONSECRATION, FAITH AND CORPORATE PRAYER.

I think it best that in the last article in the present Prayer Series that we look at the remaining three types of prayer.

THE PRAYER OF CONSECRATION — this prayer usually rises up in response to something God has done for us or a realisation of how much God loves us. In response to this we offer ourselves unreservedly to God's service for a set period of time, or for the rest of our lives. There are many examples of this throughout the Bible. In some churches there is a service on New Year's Day inviting people to consecrate themselves to serving God. Perhaps the most well known prayer is John Wesley's Covenant Prayer:

I am no longer my own, but thine. Put me to what thou wilt, rank me with whom thou wilt. Put me to doing, put me to suffering. Let me be employed for thee or laid aside for thee, exalted for thee or brought low for thee. Let me be full, let me be empty. Let me have all things, let me have nothing. I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal. And now, O glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, thou art mine, and I am thine. So be it. And the covenant which I have made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. Amen.

THE PRAYER OF FAITH - Sometimes I feel a bit discouraged that I have been praying for people or situations for years and nothing seems to happen. It is now we pray, believing God will answer our prayers at the right time. Perhaps we should ask God to help us see the answer because God knows the best answer and it may not be what we were expecting. The prayer of faith can be leaving the person or situation in God's hands and to stop worrying about it.

I comfort myself by reading from James Chap 5:

Are any of you suffering hardships? You should pray. Are any of you happy? You should sing praises. Are any of you sick? You should call for the elders of the church to come and pray over you, anointing you with oil in the name of the Lord. Such a prayer offered in faith will heal the sick, and the Lord will make you well.

CORPORATE PRAYER - This is when we come together to services, prayer meetings and prayer partnerships to worship, study the Bible and pray together and is a source of great blessing to all and our communities too.


