






Two more huge 'Thank Yous'








A Harvest Acrostic









Advent heralds the beginning of the Church's Year and so what better time could there be to explain the ...

LITURGICAL COLOURS AND SEASONS

Throughout the Church's year, the colours of the priest's vestments change. These colours are not chosen at random — each carries a deep and beautiful meaning, helping us to enter more fully into the mystery of the season or feast being celebrated.

The Church draws these colours from the beauty of creation itself, reminders of God's goodness, grace, and the many blessings we receive through His Son, Jesus Christ. The principal colours used are white (or gold), purple (or violet), green, red, and rose pink.

WHITE/GOLD

White (or gold) is a colour of joy, purity, and celebration. It is used during the great seasons of Christmas and Easter, and on major feast days — such as the celebrations of the Lord (other than His Passion), of the Blessed Virgin Mary, of the Holy Angels, and of Saints who were not martyrs.

White reminds us of Christ's victory over sin and death, and because it symbolises the Resurrection, it is also the colour often worn at funerals, expressing our Christian hope in eternal life.

PURPLE

Purple (or violet) is the colour of repentance, penance, and preparation. It is worn during the reflective seasons of Advent and Lent. In Lent, it calls us to prayer, fasting, and almsgiving — a time of quiet reflection and renewal.

During Advent, a softer, rose-tinted purple reminds us of the sky before sunrise — the world waiting in joyful hope for the coming of Christ, the Light of the world.

Purple also recalls humility. The violet flower bows its head, a symbol of the humble heart that turns to God. In the early Church, purple dye was rare and costly — we remember Lydia, the seller of purple cloth, who supported St Paul in his missionary work (Acts 16:14–15).

GREEN

Green is the colour of life, growth, and hope. It is worn most often during the weeks of Ordinary Time, representing the steady and faithful journey of the Christian life.

Just as nature grows quietly and steadily, so too does our faith as we walk daily with the Lord. Green symbolises the grace of God continually drawing us closer to His life and love.

RED

Red symbolises blood and fire — signs of sacrifice and the Holy Spirit. It is worn on Passion (Palm) Sunday, Pentecost, and for the celebration of Confirmation, reminding us of the Spirit's power and presence.

Red is also the colour of martyrdom, worn on the feast days of those who gave their lives for their faith, witnesses to the love of Christ even unto death.

ROSE PINK

Rose pink is a gentle and joyful colour, used only twice a year — on the Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday) and the Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday). Both days begin with a call to rejoice, even in the midst of a penitential season. The rose vestments remind us that joy and hope are never far away, even in times of waiting or repentance.

A Reflection

In every season, the Church's colours speak silently but beautifully of the mystery of our faith. They guide us through the rhythm of the liturgical year — from repentance to joy, from death to new life — as we walk together in the light of Christ.





Re-kindling by Christine Harbour

Most of us love a wedding. It's after all a love story. \bigcirc My grandson waited a long time to find his true love. One summer evening in London he boarded the tube train for home. Sitting across from him was a beautiful girl. He couldn't take his eyes off her, and happily she seemed to be smiling back.? He missed his home stop and alighted the tube when she herself got off, then either boldly or shyly,

asked for her phone number! In September this year the pair were married in Caiscais, Portugal. The service was quite moving and at one stage in the ceremony they were given a wooden box containing a bottle of wine. In it they had to put in a love letter which they had



written to each other. They were then instructed to open it and read the letters to each other on every wedding anniversary. If they drank the wine, they must replace it till their next anniversary. I am sure this was to remind them of their first meeting, and their special wedding. Hopefully this simple reminder would help them to put any problems to right and re-kindle their love for each other.

We often need reminders to be grateful for all we have. To re-stock ourself with precious memories when our minds are often clogged with anxiety and worries.

There couldn't be a better time than Christmas to re-kindle our love for family and friends. A time when we reach out to the unloved and displaced, to feed them, clothe them and befriend them. A time to remember that God the Father became God incarnate in the form of a tiny baby, born in a smelly cattle shed. A time when we gasp at the sacrifice of a God of Divinity who came down to tread this earth to experience life alongside of us. Christmas is the time when we can we re-kindle our love for him as we celebrate the enormity of the gift of lesus.

I remember in my early married life when we had a coal fire. Every morning there was no clicking on the central heating. Instead we screwed up newspaper, laid tiny strips of wood on the paper (kindle wood) then the coal. St Stephen's Parish Clock Appeal

Dear Friends,

You may have noticed — or perhaps not, which somehow would be worse — that the clock on St

Stephen's has stopped. Its hands are fixed stubbornly in place, pointing to a time of no great importance, like a reluctant schoolboy told to answer a question in class. It has given up, and it has done so without so much as a by -your-leave. Now, our clock has never been one of the grand affairs. It doesn't chime on the hour like some, reminding the whole neighbourhood when it's time to turn the sausages. It has always been a quieter sort of companion, content to mark the passing of the day without drawing too much attention to itself. But if you live in Burnley Wood you'll know it's always been there — a dependable face keeping watch over the streets, the mills, the rooftops. What it has done particularly well, especially in more recent years, is glow. In days gone by, when the illumination came from ordinary bulbs, the clock face had a kind of warm, buttery light about it gentle, forgiving, like lamplight falling on a familiar armchair. These days, of course, we have LEDs: sharp, efficient, a little less forgiving, but doing the job nonetheless. And that job is important. It's surprising how comforting it is, turning the corner on a dark winter's night and seeing the clock shining above, pointing you homeward.

Unfortunately, getting it going again won't come cheap. £4,000 is the estimate, which makes you wonder how such a small space can hold quite so much expense. It's not a sum the church can manage alone, and so we're appealing for your help. A pound, a note, the cost of a bag of chips or a couple of pints — whatever you can spare. Each contribution will bring us closer to seeing the hands move once again and the face of the clock glow across Burnley Wood. After all, a church without its clock is like a vicar without his bicycle — it can be managed, but really, it isn't quite the same.

It would be a fine thing, wouldn't it, to put the clock on our list of jobs for 2026? To begin the new year not only with fresh resolutions but with a warm glow — quite literally — on the tower of St Stephen's.

The clock has been part of our lives for longer than most of us can

remember. It deserves, I think, to be coaxed gently back into life, to go on keeping its silent vigil for another generation. And of course, Christmas will soon be upon us — holding, as it does, the spirit of the season in that peculiar mixture of tinsel and truth. The church will smell faintly of polish and orange peel, the choir will be muffled in scarves, and someone will always forget the last verse of "Once in Royal." Still, that's half the charm.

May I wish you all a very happy and holy Christmastide, and indeed a peaceful and contented New Year, 2026 — one perhaps a little brighter, and with the St Stephen's clock ticking gently along beside us.


