

Dear Friends,

Firstly thank you to all of you. Liz and I are incredibly grateful for our fantastic welcome in Burnley. I am here as your parish priest to serve you, so do be in touch and let me know where

you need me to be.

It is hard to write of Easter hope with the long Passiontide of Ukraine and so many others filling our news. But the bitterness of war now so close to people we feel are so like us is all too familiar. In these and too many other places in our world, bad things are happening to people not so very different from us. We may be insulated from them because they are not so close or no longer newsworthy, or their agony has gone on too long to feature anymore in our news stories.

Paul speaks of the resurrection like this. In I Corinthians 15. "I handed on to you as of first importance what I, in turn, had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures."

We may wonder exactly what that means, and John explains it in this way, "Jesus Christ the righteous ... the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world."

There is a long tradition in Christian devotion that the burden Christ bore on the first Good Friday was not just the weight of the wooden cross and the brutality of crucifixion but also the weight and pain of the world. Yet as the prayers in the funeral service put it, God's "mighty power brings joy out of grief and life out of death." As God's people, we are not just a Good Friday people but also an Easter people in whom the power of God is at work.

Our churches should be places where all are welcomed and loved. We cannot take on the whole world's pain single-handedly, but we can pray and be the hands and feet of Jesus in our communities today. We can respond with love to the needs of others. We can share their pain by listening and action. We can speak truth to power, seeking justice and equality for all.

As we journey with Jesus through Holy week to the joy of the resurrection and our Easter celebration, may we be reminded again of God's power at work in Christ when he raised him from the dead. "With God, all things are possible.

The challenge for us is how to make God's life and power a reality in our world today.

How can we be Easter people in a Good Friday world?

We had our last service of the vacancy with Rev Frances on 19th February, and Fr Andrew popped in for a visit after the service so that people could meet him for the first time before his induction. We are very grateful to Rev Frances Guite and all the visiting clergy who led services following Fr Paul's departure, including Rev Paul Benfield, Rev Nigel Kroukamp and Rev Kat Gregory-Witham, and we thank them for their assistance.

The induction service at St Stephen's on Monday 20th February went very well, as Fr Andrew took possession of the benefice and he and his family were welcomed by the congregation. It is great to finally have our new Rector with us and he has certainly been busy getting involved and meeting people across the benefice over the last few weeks.

The Wednesday morning Communion Service at St Peter's will now take place every week rather than once a fortnight as previously. We hope as many as possible will be able to come to this more regular service, so please do come along weekly at 10.30am.

As we approach Easter, the Thursday Lent Groups have proven very popular, providing a useful opportunity to think and chat with others during this time of reflection.

During Holy Week there will be a number of services across the benefice. At St Peter's, as well as morning services on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, and the Wednesday communion service, there is a Maundy Thursday Eucharist at 7pm including the stripping of the altar and a vigil, and an all-age service on Good Friday at 10.30am followed by Hot Cross Buns. St Stephen's will have Eucharists on Monday and Tuesday and a more formal service for adults on Good Friday at 2pm. We hope this will enable everyone to find an opportunity to worship and reflect during this most important time.

Roger, as you know, is a well-known local historian and a very interesting speaker, many of you having enjoyed his tours of the church at last years' Heritage Day. We hope you will come along to listen to what should be a very enjoyable talk.



ST PETER'S CHURCH HERITAGE OPEN DAY 16TH SEPTEMBER 2023

The 900th Anniversary Committee (now the Heritage Open Day Committee) have agreed to hold another Open Day on Saturday 16th September 2023 from 11.00am to 4.00pm.

Although we don't intend to make a Heritage Day an annual event, we feel that, building on the experience gained last year, we can make this bigger and better. There will be tours of the Churchyard b Roger Frost, exhibits by the Civic Trust, Briercliffe Society and others, together with displays from the archives as per last year.

In addition, we will hopefully be using more recent material for displays and would ask that people search out photographs of Christmas and Summer Fairs, Christmas Tree Festivals, Walking Days and any other events for which they may have photos. My prayers are for you my unforgettable friend Jo:



Carol also attended a a lively session with Bishop Philip concerned with encouraging children to articulate their faith. The day finished with a session reminding us that to move forward our churches must be diverse and represent all in our community - encouraging us to check our resources reflect this.


