

# From the Rectory

Dear friends,

Ash Wednesday, the 5th of March, starts the season of Lent with a celebration of the Eucharist and the imposition of ashes. This year, the service will be at 10.30 am at St Peter's. I will say these words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust, you shall return." Lent is, in a sense, a metaphor for our lives. We are born out of the smallest of particles. We make our way from our mother's womb into the wonder of the world through a multitude of various experiences toward the inevitability of death, where we again become the minutest of particles. But, for a person of faith, death leads to another birth from the womb of this world to a new experience of living.

We embark upon Lent as we embark upon life, starting no doubt with good intentions and aspirations, soon to be challenged by temptations, not unlike Jesus' time in the wilderness for forty days and

forty nights. But because He endured such an experience, we know that He is with us every step of our journey, even into the darkness of death and to what is beyond.

As with any journey, when we pack, we only take what is necessary for the journey. Anything that is not needed can be shed. In this sense, we are all called in Lent to be stripped of those burdens that prevent our progress, be they possessions, distracting habits, or unhelpful relationships.

When we consider what to give up during Lent, we may well wish to express this in some material form: biscuits, cake, plastic packaging, or even by giving up wine! It is also good to discipline our bodies, as they indulge for so much of the time. But essentially, what we are invited to do is to consider afresh what is of real and lasting importance in our lives and allow ourselves to be stripped of all except those things that assist us on our journey. A journey that embraces the pleasures and privilege of living, a journey during which we can make strong and sustaining relationships with others, a journey where hopefully we will improve the lives of others on our way, and a journey that will take us deeper into the heart of God where we will know that we are truly loved and cared for.

I give thanks that we are on this journey together: to encourage and support one another, to help prompt each other through the hard times and cravings, and to remind each other that Jesus is drawing us ever closer to Himself and each other, through all the experiences, challenges and opportunities of this life, even through the darkness of death, into the wonders of what He has in store for us in His Resurrection Kingdom.

## St Stephen's Electoral Roll Revision

The best way is by going to the Electoral Roll page of St Stephen's Church Website (http://wwwststephenschurchburnley.org.uk) and clicking on the link. You can also scan the QR code and complete it that way. Alternatively, you can pick up a form in church - these will be available from 2nd March - and hand it to me, or to either of the Churchwardens before the 22nd April. Please note that ALL those presently on the Electoral Roll of St Stephen's will need to complete a form in order to be added to the new Roll.

We had an excellent start to our new series of concerts on 1st February, with a very well supported recital given by Dimitra Ananiadou (violin) and Richard Whalley (piano). Their virtuoso performance of Beethoven's *Kreutzer* Sonata met with rapturous applause and we hope that they will return to St Peter's in the near future.

On Saturday 1st March we welcome Dominic Downs, a hugely talented composer, classical and jazz pianist, who has composed music for the Royal Family and has been described on BBC1 as, 'an extraordinary talent with a bright future ahead of him'. He is a former student of Chetham's School of Music and is currently studying at the Royal Northern College of Music under Dr Murray McLachlan. He began his musical career as a chorister at Lancaster Priory and has recently been appointed as Director of the Lancaster Millennium Choir.

Saturday 5th April sees the welcome return visit of Kate Daggett (soprano) and Tom Daggett (piano and organ). Kate has sung with a number of operatic societies in Harrogate. Since moving to Burnley, she joined the Burnley Light Opera Society and performed in shows ranging from Anything Goes, Me and My Girl, Carousel, Jesus Christ Superstar and the Pirates of Penzance. She broadened her singing repertoire by joining the highly-acclaimed Renaissance Singers at Blackburn Cathedral. Tom is a conductor and organist and is regarded as one of the leading musical educators in the UK. He has recently returned to his birth county of Yorkshire after spending nine years at St Paul's Cathedral in London (where he pioneered an inspirational music partnership programme for thousands of children) to become the new Director of Music and Schools Singing Programme at Sheffield Cathedral.

Concerts start at 11.00 a.m. with refreshments served from 10.30 a.m. Admission is £7 (free for U18s) and includes refreshments. Disabled parking is available in the church grounds with additional free parking in the nearby school yard on Rawcliffe Street, BB11 2DL.

Our Youth forum took place on Saturday the 25th of January. We came together and discussed what had een changed since the last Youth Forum, and what could be improved. We discussed other ways in which we can ensure Church is a safe place for everyone, not just the youth, and how God would want Church to look in 2033.

We discovered that there may not be many youth going to churches, as in a lot of churches they aren't involved and don't have a voice. ## First Signs of Spring on the Wing

GOD'S ACRE You can listen as well as look for the first signs of spring and the call of the Chiffchaff never fails to delight. This small buff and brown bird, sometimes described by bird watchers as one of the Small Brown Jobs or SBJs, is for many the sound of early spring. Chiffchaffs are not true migrants, but they do move south in response to cold weather, often wintering in southern Europe. They have always been one of the first birds to return in spring and now, in response to climate change, more Chiffchaffs are remaining in the UK over winter, moving to warmer places and waiting for spring before starting to sing

The Chiffchaff is a leaf warbler, restlessly searching for small insects on the undersides of leaves, sometimes hovering and reaching to pick them off or darting out to catch them on the wing when, if you listen carefully, you may hear its bill snap shut on the insect. Its fine, needle-like bill is perfect for picking up its prey.

The Chiffchaff calls its name, an example of onomatopoeia like the Cuckoo. It has a loud, two-tone song and can sing for hours on end. March is a great

time to spot as well as hear Chiffchaffs as many of the taller trees that they favour are still without leaves. British warblers tend to have subtle, camouflaged plumage and many look very similar, particularly if you are peering into a tree or shrub catching a glimpse of part of a moving bird! The Chiffchaff is nearly identical to the Willow Warbler for example but has a completely different song and this is the easiest way to identify these birds.



So listen out for your first Chiffchaff and if you hear one in your local churchyard or cemetery then you can record it using iNaturalist by visiting

https://uk.inaturalist.org/projects/beautiful-burial-grounds

You can use this to upload a recording of the song, much easier than trying to get a photograph!



For those of you who read the parish magazine, you will remember that I promised you the epilogue to the wonderful account of Elizabeth and Mary. John the Baptist was the prologue to the Christmas story, Mary and Joseph with baby Jesus being the narrative. So who then is the epilogue to this wonderful story? This is none other than Simeon. 
Create space in my life for more kindness and less spitefulness, greater generosity and few self-centered needs, stronger compassion and weakened judgement of others.
