The Kingdom of Heaven is like a Mustard Seed

Dear Friends, Do you remember the phrase from a fairy tale of 'Fee-Fi-Fo-Fum, I smell the blood of an

Englishman'? It was from the "Jack and the Beanstalk" fable: Jack's mother scorns the tiny beans he brings home from the market. They can never live off those! So in anger, she hurls them out the window. Those beans were a non-starter, a mistake, a dead-end nutritionally and in every other sense. Except that, of course, they ended up sprouting into an enormous beanstalk.

Seeds are amazing things, so how do we plant them in our churches? In September, we begin our new service patterns at each church, praying we can grow in number, faith, and love. We continue to build on the past and walk in faith into the future. We aim to engage with our young people through Sunday School/Club, our Tots group, and engaging sessions like PGi Friday and afterschool activities. We continue to engage with our older congregation through the Lunch Club and Friends, Food, and Fun. A new initiative in September will be the Bible course for both enquirers, those seeking confirmation, and those who know the Bible. All these seeds are planted to stimulate a connection and a culture where **All** are invited and **All** are welcome.

New beginnings, like seeds, start small, but with the right environment and conditions can grow into large trees and ventures. I want to commend the small, new beginnings of our Benefice.

What is the church for? What is God's vision for Burnley? The key vision for our parish at the moment, I believe, is for us to continue to grow as a place of hospitality, welcome, and inclusion. The community of Burnley is culturally and spiritually diverse, bringing richness to the quality of all our lives. A daunting challenge, but I suspect we are called to the centre of it, working with the lost, lonely, and broken.



The PCC has agreed that the monthly service pattern at St Peter's will change from September. LOOKING BACK

Are you Scams aware? - Those of us who were fortunate enough to listen to Wendy Delaney from Age UK talk about scams awareness were treated to a great, informative and interactive sessions on the massive topic of scamming. We all thought we were pretty clued up but our eyes were further opened by Wendy's facts and figures. Wendy, who is an ex police officer, is coming to the end of a two year contract with Age UK, tasked with spreading the word and writing a report on the subject. With no notes to hand, Wendy covered everything and more. The majority of scams are masterminded by organised crime and it is BIG business for them. As Wendy said, if it seems too good to be true it usually is.

Two weeks later in the evening we followed up with our own DIY scams session with a couple of good humoured playlets about scams and further discussion. The mini plays were light hearted but further enhanced the same message not to get drawn in

A Local Charity targeting Social Isolation and Loneliness. - In August Chris Emerson came along to talk about the Accrington based charity 'Community Solutions'. Community Solutions operates out of the grade two listed Elmfield House, owned by Hyndburn Council and leased long term to the charity. Those who find themselves in social isolation and/or facing loneliness are targeted for help. The only stipulation is being able to travel to Elmfield House. The charity has permanent staff as well as over eighty volunteers who run courses and work as befrienders to the people they want to help. Befrienders will phone, visit and accompany people to their first one or two sessions. Chris, who worked for many years at Burnley Football Club, spreads awareness and applies for grants both large and small. The good news is the charity doesn't just help people from Accrington. It covers the Burnley and Colne areas as well.

There is a cafe - Mr Gatty's Tearoom within Elmfield House - well worth a visit!

EXPLORING PRAYER Part III

CONFESSION

Welcome to session 3 and thank you Brenda for the lovely feedback about your relationship with God.

Confession – oh dear! Just the word makes me feel guilty. It seems to imply a sense of failure too. It can be like being called to the headmaster's office for a telling off, not really conducive to a good relationship. BUT our Father God loves us and, I am convinced He does not want us to spend precious time together going over our wrongdoing and failures - real or imaginary.

As part of our ongoing relationship with God it is good to spend time together talking about our day, the good and the not so good and perhaps to include a plan of change in certain areas. When we review our day we might be surprised to see how much of God, joy, goodness and friendship has been in the day. This type of prayer was first practised by St Ignatius and his followers and known as the Examen. It is designed to bring us closer to God and be able to let Him fill us with His love and peace.

If you would like to try this I have included below a prayer of Examen:

I thank you, Lord Jesus for always being with me, but especially I am grateful that you are with me right now, send your Holy Spirit upon me and let the Holy Spirit enlighten my mind and warm my heart that I may know where and how we have been together this day.

Lord Jesus, let me look at my day with you:

What has been good today? Where have I felt your presence, seen your face, heard your word this day? What has brought me joy? Whose company have I enjoyed? Thank God for the good in the day.

What hasn't gone well today? Have I ignored you, run from you, excluded you today. What has gone wrong today? Have I upset anyone today? Have I been upset today?

God, forgive me and help me to forgive anyone who has hurt me. Lord Jesus, I thank you for the times this day we have been together and worked together. I ask that you draw me ever closer to you this day and tomorrow.

Lord Jesus, you are the God of my life—thank you.


Rolls and Roles

Making Disciples - St Peter's



Linda w^orit**es** ..

Hi everyone, I hope that, despite the weather, you have enjoyed the summer.

In August we held our latest Prayer Breakfast. As it was the 12th of August, otherwise known as the Glorious Twelfth, the theme was "Our Glorious God". I thought I would share with you part of the talk I gave. Thinking about the Glory of God and how as a Church we respond.

According to the Oxford Dictionary, 'glorious' can mean worthy of, wonderful, marvellous. These are all words we can use when we think about God.

To glorify God is to have the heart that stands in wonderment seeing that for God everything is possible.

The Church is nothing without the presence and glory of God. Too often we focus on other things as most important. God's glory is most important for the people of God. The church must be captivated by the beauty of God.

If we look at Acts 2:42-47, there are at least 7 characteristics that were visible in the first-century Church. These characteristics made the Church of that day a powerhouse in their community.

What about our churches? Can we also use those characteristics to become one that truly glorifies God.

• A CHURCH BUILT ON GOD'S HOLY WORD

"They devoted themselves to the Apostles' teaching" (Acts 2:42)

The believers were devoted to the teaching of God's holy Word. This means that they loved hearing, receiving, and obeying the teaching of the Word as directed by the Apostles. The Word is also symbolised as being a mirror that reflects truth, a seed that germinates and brings fruit, bread that gives spiritual life, a lamp that gives light and guidance, and as a sword, a hammer, and a fire. It is milk that nourishes a new believer and meat that strengthens a mature believer! More of God's Word will bring more glory to His name.

A FRIENDLY CHURCH

"They devoted themselves ... to the fellowship" (Acts 2:42)

From this passage we get the feeling that this Church was a happening place. It was an attractive place with a warm, family feeling where people felt they belonged. That's probably why in Acts 2:46 it says that "Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts."

The words 'glad' and 'sincere hearts' show that they clearly enjoyed being a part of the

community every day, and that there was a lot of godly love bein

was a lot of godly love being spread around.

A CHURCH ENERGISED BY PRAYER AND WORSHIP

"They devoted themselves ... to prayer" (Acts 2:42)

The believers were in constant prayer and worship, both individually and corporately, which in turn energised all they did. Acts 2:47 tells us that they were "praising God (daily) and enjoying the favour of all the people."



The Church in Acts was energised by prayer and worship. When they prayed and worshipped, rooms were literally

shaken. If we, too, focused more on prayer and worship, our churches would be energised to accomplish greater works for God.

A CHURCH POWERED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT

"Everyone was filled with awe, and many wonders and miraculous signs were done by the Apostles" (Acts 2:43)



The church in Acts was powered by the Holy Spirit. As a result, signs, wonders, and miracles were a common occurrence and 'everyone was filled with awe.' This power at work through the Holy Spirit is further emphasised in Acts 4:33 where it says, "With great power the Apostles continued to testify to the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus" and in Acts 5:12, which says, "The Apostles performed many miraculous signs and wonders among the people." May we experience that power whenever our congregations come together to worship the Saviour. Truly, the Lord will be glorified.

A CHURCH MARKED BY GENEROSITY

"All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as he had need" (Acts 2:44-45)

What amazing generosity is revealed in those verses! As the church grew in 'leaps and bounds' and the numbers increased rapidly, many urgent needs



would have surfaced. The believers responded magnificently by sharing all they owned to meet those needs. As a result, the Lord was glorified.

The Church of our day, too, needs to be marked by overflowing generosity.

A CHURCH THAT EVANGELISED DAILY

"And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved" (Acts 2:47) People being saved daily meant that the believers were sharing the Gospel daily. The Book of Acts shows us that regular evangelism was the clear pattern of their ministry. They refused to be stopped, even when threatened, beaten, or imprisoned.

I read this story on line. It's about a Christian whose neighbour was an avid golfer. It so happened that they both came out of their houses around the same time on Sunday mornings, one to go to the golf course and the other to go to church. The neighbour apparently invited the Christian to join him on the golf course many times but the offer was always politely declined on the grounds that he had to be in church at that time. One day after another invitation to play golf on a Sunday was politely declined, the neighbour said, "It's strange isn't it?

Although I have invited you to play golf many times on a

Sunday, you have not invited me to your church even once!"

Let's keep sharing the Gospel whenever and wherever an opportunity arises.

A CHURCH OF EXTREME DEVOTION - "They devoted themselves..." (Acts 2:42)

These early Christians were totally and extremely devoted. They were committed to God's Word, to fellowship, to prayer and worship, to the Holy Spirit's work, to generosity, and to evangelism.

Today, the word 'extremist' has many negative connotations like 'illegal,' 'violent,' 'fanatic,' and 'militant.' However, these believers showed an extremism that had only one purpose and goal; that was to bring glory to God!

May we too be extreme in our devotion to the living God so that we may bring glory to His name!

Just as exciting is that from September both St. Peter's and St. Stephen's will be running "The Bible Course". What's it about? Here's what it says on the Bible Society website:

Whether you're well versed in Scripture or new to the Bible, The Bible Course offers a superb overview of the world's best-selling book. The course will increase your confidence, equip you to read the Bible better and help you to see its relevance to daily life. Over eight interactive sessions, it combines video teaching, group discussion, personal reflection and daily readings. Meeting people in groups, where everyone shares their thoughts and experiences, lies at the heart of The Bible Course as everyone learns from each other.


